1.0. Introduction

The University of Nairobi applied for a first tranche of the funds totalling \$12,085 in April 2012. However, there was a delay in the release of these funds until June 2012 owing to documentation procedures. Data collection and literature review had commenced in April 2012 and has been on going.

This far, the Kenyan team has managed to review literature and collect price data for three food commodities (maize, wheat and Rice) over the January 2002 to December 2011period at the wholesale and retail levels as shown in the table below. The markets covered in Kenya are Nairobi, Mombasa, Nakuru, Kisumu and Eldoret.
